

The Woods will be a multi-purpose youth centre. On the one hand there will be open access of 11 to 18 year olds every night of the week.


Young people, perhaps in difficulty, can come to the Woods and we're sure we will be able to help them out.



The time has come folks! Wester Hailes is getting a new youth centre. It'll have a soundproof music room for doing your own thing (or learning to play an instrument).


There'll be a cafe for meeting old and new friends and at the same time you can have a coffee or a coke on the balcony.

At the end of March 1987, 5 people from Wester Hailes discussed the idea of a big youth centre. Once again the people of Wester Hailes were showing the way in the development of their community. There arguments were taken from life: kids on the streets with nothing to do, young folk stuck in the house because parents were frightened of older kids bullying them, local clubs struggling to cope with young folk in trouble.

What was needed was a well staffed centre where parents could get involved as well and see what was happening.

The Steering Goup as it was called, wanted to make as many adults aware of the project as possible. We wanted local folk to actually



help the project get off the ground, helping to plan and run it.

This meant a lot of work — work which was perhaps new to people.

So What Happened?

Well, with a questionaire we asked you if

You were interested. Obviously people would have to learn new skills—like talking to groups of people, meeting other folk regularly and working as a team. And that's where we are just now. Naturally people want to know more before they jump in, but here at the Representa-
